'HIT SOMEONE over the head with a discarded chrome fender and kill them: life. Take the precaution of attaching the fender to a car and kill them: six months, licence to drive temporarily suspended.'

That's from Autogeddon, Heathcote Williams's polemic against the motor car, published in 1991. If anything, the second part is exaggerated: it's common for drivers who kill to receive no custodial sentence at all

The law deals with intent as much as consequences. So drivers who kill aren't literally getting away with murder. How about manslaughter? Killing through 'gross negligence' sounds apt for the worst cases.

Time and again, however, selfevidently dangerous drivers are not even charged with dangerous driving. They're charged with the lesser offence of careless driving. Careless! Careless is when you spill a cup of coffee. Not looking where you're going in a vehicle weighing upwards of a tonne, at a speed of up to 60mph, is surely by definition dangerous.

The roll call of cyclists who have been killed or injured by drivers who couldn't be bothered to look where they were going would make grim reading, and the paltry sentences they got would make grimmer reading still. For the cyclists' families, it must be devastating, insulting, infuriating.
